City of Houston OEM Mission

- OEM is responsible for coordinating preparedness, response, recovery, and mitigation efforts for emergencies and disasters within the city.
- Our Mission: We are committed to safeguarding everyone who lives, works, and plays in Houston against all hazards and threats.
 - Partnerships: city, local, regional, state, and federal agencies



Duty Officer Program

- Rotation of emergency on-call contact 24/7/365
 - NOT the same as a 24-hour watch officer
- Standard Operating Procedures and Guidelines
- Daily responsibilities
 - Planned/special events
 - Monitoring weather, partner notifications
 - Brief OEM Leadership on significant events, incidents

 - Social media: preparedness and awareness

 - 11 media inquiries, 7 on-camera interviews in June 2025

Enhanced Awareness and Alerts

- Enhanced Blue-Sky methods
- Interviews and media inquiries
- AlertHouston and STEAR notifications
- Stand up the Joint Information Center:
 - Ensures consistent and accurate messaging
 - Brings together PIOs from multiple agencies
 - Reduces misinformation and rumor spread
 - Enhances public trust through coordinated communication







Alert Houston

- Target audience public, voluntary enrollment
- Enhanced awareness
- Encouraged/voluntary actions
- Since August 2025
 - 5 Total Messages
 - Winter Weather: Jan 18th, 20th, and 21st
 - HFD Prescribed burn: March 13th
 - Severe thunderstorms: May 2nd







STEAR (State of Texas Emergency Assistance Registry)

- Target audience: vulnerable communities, voluntary enrollment
- Enhanced awareness
- Encouraged/voluntary actions
- Post incident wellness/assistance check
- Use Since August 2025
 - Seven Total Messages
 - Five Winter Weather 2025
 - Two Hurricane Preparedness

IPAWS – FEMA Tool



- Integrated Public Alert & Warning System (IPAWS) is a tool that Federal, State, Local, Tribal, and Territorial (FSLTT) public safety agencies can use to notify the public of disasters and deliver emergency and public safety information.
- FSLTT public safety agencies can sign up to become an Alerting Authority (Requirements).
- Examples: Amber Alerts, NWS Alerts, Public Safety Alerts.



IPAWS Vs. AlertHouston

IPAWS

- Sent to all phones in the geo-targeted area
- Supports English and Spanish languages
- Supports clickable URLs
- Ongoing retransmission of WEA for duration of the alert
- Ability to update and/or cancel active WEA
- Unique tone and vibration
- No need to opt in to receive WEA
 - Residents can "TURN OFF"
- Not affected by network congestion and will not disrupt texts
- No tracking of individuals by phone number

AlertHouston

- Must subscribe, opt-in
- Track delivery and feedback
- Support clickable URLs
- Sent in English and Spanish languages
- Ongoing retransmission for duration of the alert
- Target/limited distribution lists



IPAWS – Main Pathways

- Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA)
 - Cell phone
- Emergency Alert System (EAS)
 - Radio and Television
- NOAA Weather Radio











IPAWS Examples

- Partner Alert Examples
 - Tornado Warning
 - Flash Flood Warning
 - Hurricane Warning
 - Ice Storm Warning
 - AMBER Alerts
- Houston OEM Examples
 - Citywide Emergencies
 - Evacuation Orders
 - Shelter-in-Place Emergencies







Emergency Alert

- Imminent immediate action to preserve life or property
- Public Safety non-life threatening, provide benefit

Description

 Hurricane Amy, Category 5 storm, 175 mph wind, 18-20' storm surge.

Action Time

 Zone B Mandatory evacuation begins at 6pm Monday, June 6

Emergency Alert

[Local, familiar, authoritative source]
[description of threat] in [location of hazard and consequences]. [Protective action] by [action time].

Location

Life safety storm surge, Mandatory Evacuation for Zone B; City of Houston zip codes: 77058; 77062; 77059; 77598; 77546

Action

Implement your evacuation plan (kit, route, etc.) and safely evacuate Zone B



COH OEM Public Notification Pathways



- AlertHouston and STEAR (opt-in)
- Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA) (opt-out)
- Amplification of messages on social media and traditional media.
