
OUR MISSION

Houston's three county region has faced 28 federally declared disasters since 1980.




Live in a census tract with at least medium-high social vulnerability.




GHDA Partnership Progression

THE TEXAS A&M UNIVERSITY SYSTEM



- Prioritize data-informed strategies and approaches
- Establish data sharing agreement with trusted sources
- Rapid data analyses post-disaster to identify disproportionately impacted zip codes
- Identify disaster service deserts in blue sky days in support of year-round efforts to increase preparedness and resilience
- Evaluate impact with data from grantees and clients

YEAR 1: Building Infrastructure

- Re-engaged City and County leadership to ensure support of our partnership approach
- Formally and publicly launched the Greater Houston Disaster Alliance
- Welcomed two full-time staff who bring year-round focus and accountability
- Re-engaged nearly 200 nonprofit organizations after 3 years without a disaster
- Established the Disaster Recovery Council, the governing body for GHDA
- Crafted efficient joint fund processes, grantmaking templates, communication protocol
- Rigorously tested new processes through a comprehensive tabletop exercise

YEAR 2: Strengthening Preparedness

- * Launched the Derecho & Beryl Recovery Funds 6 weeks apart, raised \$9.1 million
- * Served 4,100+ households through 35 nonprofits with financial assistance, resource navigation, and home repair
- * Reduced average time from disaster to Round 1 grants from 34 to 22 days
- * Strengthened key data partnerships with FEMA and TDEM
- * Refined and validated a rapid data analysis approach
- * Made our first resilience investment in a low-barrier coordinated intake pilot
- Implemented a transparent nonprofit engagement strategy
- Developed preliminary resiliency framework and pursued national funding opportunities
- Convened 38 nonprofits to build consensus and co-design program improvements
- Engaged 14 donors in thought partnership on sustainable fundraising practices

YEAR 3: Building Resilience

- MOUs with 18 key nonprofit partners to get resources to survivors in as few as 7-14 days
- Convened 100+ nonprofits, implemented learning evaluations
- Developed a first draft disaster recovery and resilience framework
- Invested \$200,000 in Connective to maintain tech required for system coordination
- * Served on Mayor Whitmire's Houston Ready Roundtable
- Through data analysis identified 29 highly vulnerable zip codes
- Pursuing national funding sources to implement strategic “proofs of concept”
- Established GHDA as a national model and produced a shareable toolkit
- Leveraged founding lead sponsorships to secure \$1.47 million in new funding in support of our Phase 2 (2026-2029)
