

3 years - 512


4 years - 2,048

6 years - 67,000


The University of Texas School of Public Health's "Health of Houston Survey" has consistently found that stray dogs and cats are the biggest concern in many Houston neighborhoods.

Percent adults reporting stray animals as a problem in their neighborhood






Percent of adults reporting concerns over neighborhood conditions


The Rice | Kinder Institute for Urban Research 2020 Houston Area Survey found that:

- One-fourth of those surveyed (25%) think stray dogs or cats are a somewhat serious or very serious problem in their neighborhood.
- Only half of all area residents (52%) said that strays were not a problem in their communities.
- Stray animals make it more difficult and dangerous to walk to school, play in neighborhood parks or use the city's hike and bike trails.

- Area animal shelters are overwhelmed.
- Existing spay-and-neutering programs are inadequate.
- Almost two-thirds of the those surveyed (64 percent) say they favor spending more tax money to reduce the number of strays in Houston neighborhoods.

Our Solution

- Provide free spay, neuter, vaccinations, and microchips for pets in underserved areas. Since 2013, we've helped over 3,000 pets.
- Raise awareness about animal overpopulation, the importance of fixing pets and proper pet care in general.
- 3 Work with elected officials to create more free and low cost spay neuter options.



Big Fix Houston

Since 2017, Unity has conducted an annual, citywide event to sign up pets for free spay or neuter, vaccinations and microchips.

Surgeries are done later at vet clinics.

The average cost per pet is \$150.

- Costs are paid for with private funds raised by Unity.
- We have also received support from city council members Karla Cisneros, Robert Gallegos and Jerry Davis.

Big Fix Houston - Results

2017 - 2020

Total spayed or neutered: 2,175 Average completion rate: 53.75%

Factors affecting completion rate

- Lack of vetting resources creates delays in scheduling services resulting in:
 - Owners changing their minds or losing interest,
 - Owner's contact information changing,
 - Owners giving away or losing the animal.
- Other factors:
 - Lack of transportation,
 - Work conflicts.

Next steps

- 1) In 2021, we are planning a yearround virtual sign-up for services. We are expanding the program because there is tremendous need, particularly in light of the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.

- 3) We hope to continue working with elected officials to better enforce existing animal welfare ordinances and pass new ones to better protect animals.
