  - Traditional fabric shed awning with sides and 7" loose/scalloped valance; sewn and laced
  - 1" square aluminum frame, attached to the brick veneer at the mortar joints.
  - o Color to be determined: hunter green, black, white, or stripped.

			(1)	The proposed activity must retain and preserve the historical character of the property;

			(3)	The proposed activity must recognize the building, structure, object or site as a product of its own time and avoid alterations that seek to create an earlier or later appearance;
			(4)	The proposed activity must preserve the distinguishing qualities or character of the building, structure, object or site and its environment;
$\boxtimes$			(5)	The proposed activity must maintain or replicate distinctive stylistic exterior features or examples of skilled craftsmanship that characterize the building, structure, object or site;
